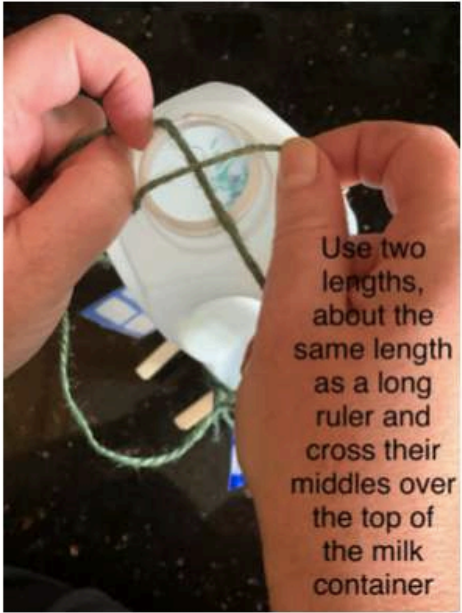
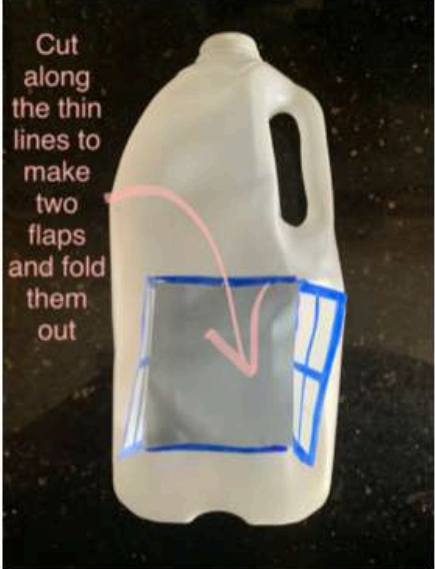
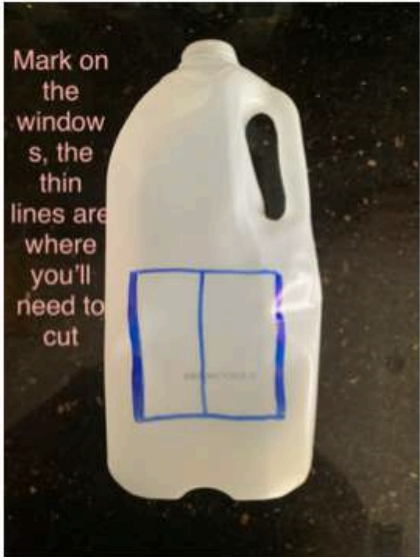


Doodle a Da Vinci

2. Use 'Mark up' to doodle on top and change them into other things and have fun!

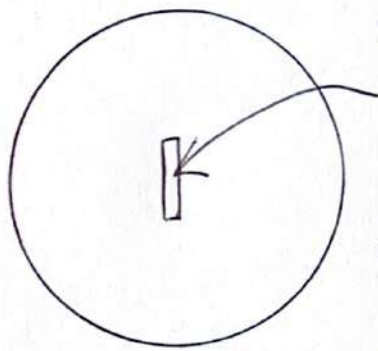


Penny Spinners

Here's another great way of using up all those toilet roll tubes, creatively!

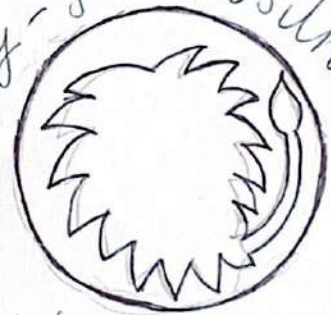
You'll need: toilet roll tubes

Host your own story-telling time in the dark

Cling-film
Sellotape
Paper
Scissors

and a SMALL TORCH that fits inside the tubes

1. Cut out some characters for a story - just the silhouette!

2. Cut a square of cling-film and tape it over the end of a toilet roll tube.

3. Next, tape your characters to the end of each toilet roll, on top of the clingfilm. Now you can tell your own story, in the dark!

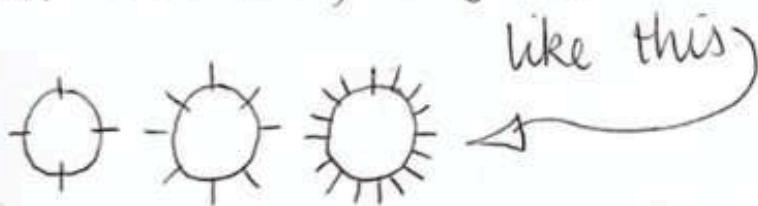
Floating Water Lillies

★ You're going to need some different sized circular objects to draw around (no bigger than a mug) to make these magical flowers. ★

1. First find your circles - I used a glue stick a glass and a toilet roll tube - I got loads of those!

2. Draw round each one, leaving lots of space in between them.

3. Mark 16 petals (a bit like putting 12, 6, 3 and 9 on a clock and then halfway between each mark and then half way again



TOP TIP -
Cut right up to
the line of the
circle when doing
the petals!

4. Now draw out your petals from the marks continue all the way round. Cut them out, carefully and colour them in.

5. Bend the petals in and put them inside each other from smallest to largest like the photo.

6. Put a very small amount of water in a bowl: just enough for your flower to float and then WATCH!
