

Egg Carton People

You'll need an egg box or two, some glue, scissors, paper and pens for this transformation

1. Start by removing the lid and trimming the edges so they're neat.
2. Next you'll need four of the dips where the eggs sit and one of the points where they stick up between the eggs. Cut them off and try them out inside the lid (2 - for the eyes) and on the edge (2 for the ears). The pointy bit can be glued in as a nose, cut it as long or short as you like. Glue them all down
3. With your pen, add a mouth - think of an expression, then add eyes to match it, lashes and mouth
4. Draw in a neck and colour up the sides of the carton towards the ears.


5. Find some paper from a magazine for some hair and add in some accessories like jewellery if you would like them.

Scrap Bugs

Practice your cutting-out skills with these cheeky little bugs! Grab an old magazine or bit of junk mail, and let's go.

1. Find some pieces of magazine with patterns on, which are nice and bright and cheerful. Cut them out and make a stash!
2. Start by cutting a 'bug body' - a long carrot shape and sticking it down (we don't want him flying off!) 

3. Next add a head with some antennae - long and thin? or short and fat? You decide.
4. Wings are next, either two, or four (like dragonflies) - stick them down. 
5. Legs come next, remember insects have six.
6. Eyes - if you have googly eyes, brilliant. If not cut some white dots and add a pupil with a pen 



Leafy Tree

You're going to need some interesting leaves - lots of different shapes and colours (these were from my garden!) and some twigs.

1. Arrange your leaves on a piece of paper until you're happy with the shape.
2. Use lots of twigs to create your trunk and put some glue down so that there is plenty to glue it well.
3. Find a nice heavy book to press down your collage until it is dry.
4. Share your beautiful creation with #SRESatHome so we can see! Why not pop it in an empty picture frame?




Article Cat

You will need a newspaper and a magazine article that someone has finished with - and some bits of magazine in a darkish colour, some glue and some scissors.


1. Cut your cat shape in 3 stages

a) head b) body c) ears



2. from a piece of "writing" in the newspaper or magazine **an editorial!**

Stick them on the page, overlapping them to make your perfect cat shape.



3. Next you'll need some triangles of different shades to make the stripes on your cat. Glue them down.

4. Find some darker bits to cut out some eyebrows, nose and mouth, glue them on

5. Snip some eye shapes - you need 4 bits for each eye - I find it easier to fold the paper

and cut two each time so that they match.


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

The Man Who Knows EVERYTHING challenged us to find out 10 facts about Vincent Van Gogh; here's my challenge to you.

1. Draw yourself a frame about 8×8 cm and have a look at Vincent's "Starry Night" picture. You need to pick yourself just a little piece of the picture, not all of it, to practice the technique and style of his work.

2. Dashes!

We are going to use 'dashes' of colour to make the small details of a bit of the sky. On your picture - on your device - zoom in and look at the paintbrush markings, see how they lie next to each other and change direction?



3. Start with a wavy line of dashes across the middle of your frame.




4. Add different shades of your colour but only use the dashes going in the right direction

5. Keep going until you have filled the square

- I used a mixture of felt-tip pens, markers, crayons and pencil crayons, but use what you have and try it out!





One-Line Faces

This takes a little bit of practice, keep going, eventually you'll end up with something you're happy with! It's a technique which Pablo Picasso used quite effectively - I'll include some photos at the end.

1. It makes sense to start on one side, go up to do the hair and then work your way down

to the other ear,


d) across to the eye down to
